VALUE FOR OCTOBER

The value for October is *Respect*. The dictionary definition is "to consider worthy of high regard or esteem." Children can show respect in many ways, for example, to themselves (self-respect), to their peers, and to authority. Some ways to foster respect are teaching your children to listen while others are talking. In modeling respect, children will see us really listen to them, give them the time they need to accomplish a task and reinforce those good manners. Remember, *please and thank you* when dealing with your children. Children become what they live and see.

MATH MOMENTS

In every classroom, at any time during the day, the potential for a "math moment" exists. The room is one big learning center where strands of mathematical discovery are continually being woven. Children learn to make sense of their world through everyday experiences.

To stimulate a math moment, teachers use a variety of materials and ideas to create an environment in which children explore math concepts. In the math center are board games, puzzles, matching and guessing games, dominoes, cards, pattern blocks, and collections of objects that give children opportunities to recognize numbers and build math skills. But math moments do not occur only in the math center. Look around our room. In block play, children construct cities (by sorting and organizing) and use words like long, short, small, and tall. At snacktime a child passes out one napkin per child and the same number of crackers for each person. We take attendance and keep track of how many days we've been in school. When the class takes a vote on what stories to read or for some other decision, children compare quantities. Parents can accept the challenge to find math moments at home and about town. With your child, identify numbers and shapes in your junk mail. As you cook or do errands together, you can make comments or ask questions that encourage meaningful math understandings. For instance, "We need a bottle of juice for each person in the family and your friend Sally, too. How many shall I get?" Children love to be consulted on such issues. Just keep it all in fun!



SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Social skills in young children are more closely associated with school readiness and success in kindergarten and first grade than cognitive and academic skills (Raver & Knitzer, 2002; Smith, 2004). Social/emotional development during the preschool years is about socialization - the process by which children learn the values and behaviors accepted by society. It is also about becoming a competent and confident person.

There are three goals for social/emotional development.

Achieving a sense of self: knowing oneself and relating to other people-both children and adults.

Taking responsibility for self and others: following rules and routines, respecting others, and taking initiative.

Behaving in a prosocial way: showing empathy and getting along in the world, for example, by sharing and taking turns. Social and emotional competence are essential to children's well being and success, in school and in life. With the current focus on readiness, accountability, and high standards, there is always a danger that programs will focus only on academic content and ignore aspects of development that are equally important for achieving long lasting and positive results.

Social and emotional readiness can be taught and nurtured most effectively when children are young. Because preschool is a prime setting for gaining social and emotional competence, social/emotional development is an important focus for teachers.

CHAPEL TIME

We incorporate a chapel time and prayer time in each classroom. The teachers will be using books, CDs, puppets, and other props to get The Message of God's love to the children. Pastor Steven will be meeting with the 3s, and 4s, classes on a monthly basis to visit and share with the children. The main emphasis will be how much they are loved and how special they are.
