#### FUNDRAISING FOR 2023-2024

The Parent/Staff Board will be planning two "fun" fundraisers this year; Super Bowl Sub Sale in February and the Prize Palooza in March/April. Details on these activities will follow later. We feel as busy parents you would prefer not to be selling and buying things that you really don't want. In lieu of having numerous fundraisers during the year, the school's primary source of fundraising is through donations that can be made two times during the year; October and February. You will receive a letter with details in those months.

#### VALUES EDUCATION

Each month in the classroom, we will be stressing a value to be practiced. For September, the value is **Cooperation.** The dictionary definition of cooperation is "to act, work, or associate with others for a mutual benefit."

#### COOPERATION

Cooperation is a skill that means the child is becoming less egocentric, so that she gives something of herself and becomes less concerned about herself and more about the welfare of the group. Guidance and support are necessary as children balance the task of developing a strong sense of self with learning to become a member of the group. Reinforcement, lessening competition and planning group activities all work to foster the behaviors associated with cooperation.

#### SENSATIONAL SAND

You've probably noticed in your yard or at the playground how much your child likes to dig in the sand. Sand is great fun, but it's also a wonderful material for learning. Children learn mathematical and scientific concepts from playing at our sand table. For instance, when kids pour sand from measuring cup to measuring cup, they are likely to be learning about estimation, volume, texture, and even counting and simple physics.

As children play with sand, we encourage them to talk about what they are doing or experiencing. For instance, we might ask, "Does the sand feel different when it is wet?" or "How did you get the sand so smooth on your castle?" Have you ever longed to dig your toes in the sand? Sand has the same soothing effect on children. We find that kids who are frustrated, annoyed, or angry often choose the sand center to work out those feelings.

You can encourage sand play at home by providing a sandbox. It does not need to be large. One excellent and inexpensive sandbox is a bin or busboy tray filled with sand. Bins and trays are portable, easy to clean, and easily stored. Provide measuring cups and spoons and other plastic containers to support sand play.

Of course, spills and stray sand go with the territory. With indoor play, a sheet or large piece of plastic will help contain the mess, but the benefits are well worth any temporary inconvenience.
