## **FUNDRAISING FOR 2025-2026**

The Parent/Staff Board will be planning two "fun" fundraisers this year; Super Bowl Sub Sale in February and the Prize Palooza in March/April. Details on these activities will follow later. We feel as busy parents you would prefer not to be selling and buying things that you really don't want. In lieu of having numerous fundraisers during the year, the school's primary source of fundraising is through donations that can be made two times during the year; October and February. You will receive a letter with details in those months.

## **VALUES EDUCATION**

Each month in the classroom, we will be stressing a value to be practiced. For September, the value is **Cooperation**. The dictionary definition of cooperation is "to act, work, or associate with others for a mutual benefit."

## **COOPERATION**

Cooperation is a skill that means the child is becoming less egocentric, so that she gives something of herself and becomes less concerned about herself and more about the welfare of the group. Guidance and support are necessary as children balance the task of developing a strong sense of self with learning to become a member of the group. Reinforcement, lessening competition and planning group activities all work to foster the behaviors associated with cooperation.

## **DO BIRDS HAVE EARS?**

Young children are naturally curious and enjoy exploring the world around them; they find countless things to observe, investigate, and wonder about.

*Why does a spider spin a web? Do birds have ears? How do fish breathe?*

Parents and teachers can foster children's natural curiosity in many ways. When a child expresses an interest in a subject or poses a question about a natural phenomenon, a trip to the library can reveal answers and open up other doors to learning. Family outings, even simple, short, inexpensive excursions, pique children's interest in the natural world. Parents and children encounter many wonders on walks through the park, along a pond, even in a neighbor's vegetable garden. Other visits can be planned to nature centers, science museums, zoos, fossil-laden hills, beaver dams-the choices are endless.

From time to time, pack a picnic lunch and make a day of it. Be sure to take along a couple of containers (at least one with air holes in it) so that you and your child can collect specimens. An inexpensive magnifying glass is also a valuable field accessory. And don't forget paper and pencils.

Talk about what you see. Your child might like to draw some observations. Encourage her questions by writing them down in a notebook for further investigation. Most of us find that we don't know the answers to all of kids' questions, and it's fun to research them together. The child's curiosity and spirit of investigation thrive when you are her fellow scientist, wondering about things and checking them out together.
